### Negligence Count Laid Against Man

#### Shots Punctuate Morning Chase In West End

Police have charged a young Windsor man with criminal negligence following a 20-minute chase at speeds up to 110 miles an hour which led to a crash that claimed the lives of two men. Four persons were injured, one of them seriously, in the violent four-car collision at Tecumseh Rd. and Howard Ave., this morning.

#### Dead are:

Robert John McCann, 19, of Clinton, Ont., a sailor serving on the H.M.C.S. Victoriaville.  
John MacPherson Fraser, 42, of 908 Ducharme Ave., Roseland, the driver of one of the cars involved.

Taken into custody after being treated for minor facial injuries was Samuel Patrick Knapp, 21, of Scotten Rd.,

20, of 1512 Bernard Rd., the driver of the fourth car involved escaped injury.

According to police the car driven by Knapp had been stopped at Walker and Tecumseh Rds. at 12:30 a.m. for making an improper left turn. About 45 minutes later the car was spotted speeding along Riverside Dr.

When police attempted to stop the speeding vehicle at Riverside Dr. and Ouellette, the chase began. Police said the driver refused to pull over to the curb.

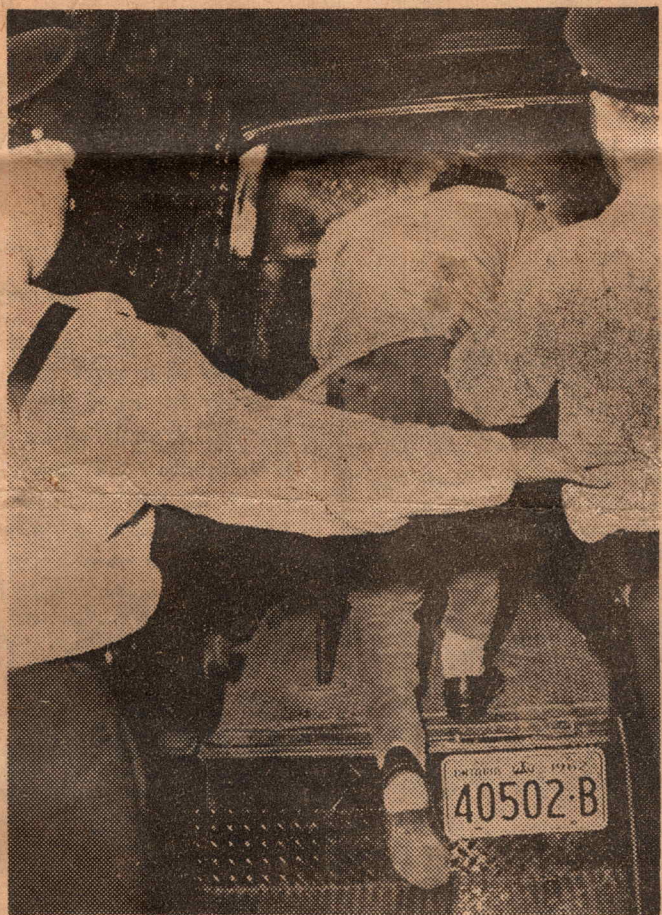
The chase continued through west end streets at high speeds and after one police cruiser lost the fleeing car at Huron Line another spotted it at Wellington St. and Tecumseh Rd. Police said speeds up to 110 miles an hour were registered along Tecumseh Rd. prior to the crash.

The speeding car was proceeding east along Tecumseh Rd. when the accident occurred, Police said the car crashed into the auto driven by Mr. Fraser at Howard Ave. and Tecumseh Rd.

Following the initial impact, the two cars collided with the third car driven by Mr. Dinsmore who in turn crashed into the Reaume car.

The force of the impact tossed Mr. McCann from the car onto the pavement. A.B.C. and Windsor Ambulance crews

Knapp, 21, of Scotten Rd., Highway 18. Knapp appeared in court this morning and was remanded until Monday. Bail was set at \$2,000 cash or property.

Police said Knapp was the driver of a stolen car and following the crash he leaped from the wrecked vehicle and attempted to escape on foot. Police fired several shots in their efforts to arrest Knapp who was captured attempting to climb a fence at the Windsor Utilities Commission yard on Howard Ave.

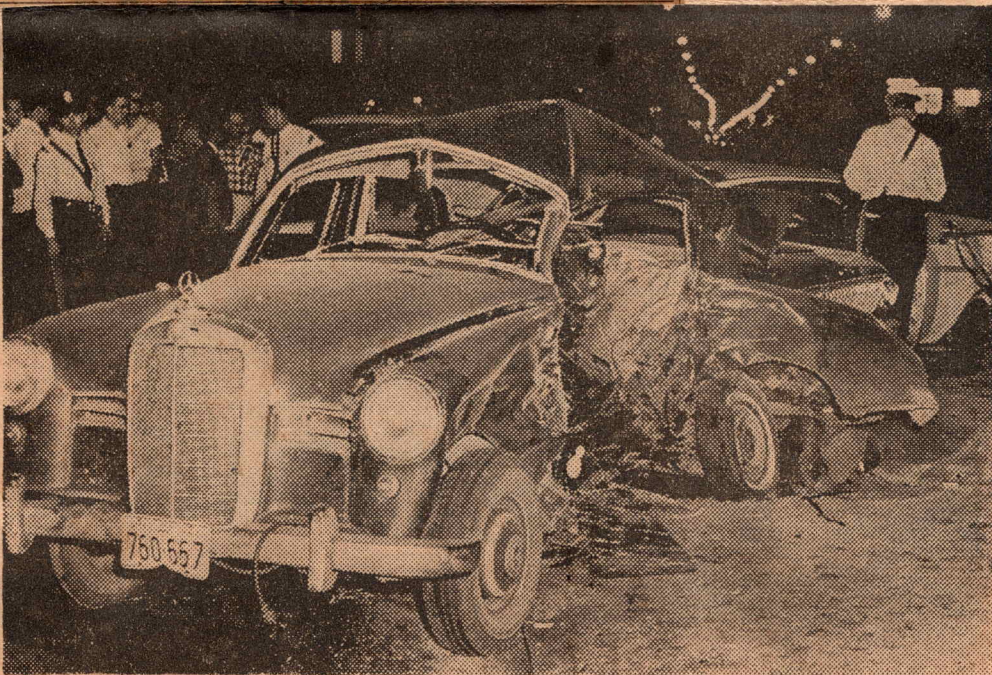
Following the accident, one man was admitted to Metropolitan Hospital in serious condition suffering from severe head injuries. He is Daniel Dumoulin, 22, of 484 Brock St., Windsor, a passenger in the speeding car. Dumoulin is being held under police guard.

Treated for minor injuries at Hotel Dieu and released were Richard A. Dinsmore, 27, of Garden City, Mich., and his wife Celina, 26. The couple's 4-year-old child escaped injury.

Knapp, driver of the speeding car was released from Hotel Dieu after being treated for facial lacerations and neck injuries.

The two men who were killed had been riding in the same car while Mr. Dinsmore was driving another. Wallace H. Reaume,

Anderson Funeral Home, 895 Ouellette Ave., is in charge of funeral arrangements, which are still incomplete.

Since April of 1955 three persons have been killed in separate accidents in Essex County where police chases were involved.

On April 15, 1955, a 21-year-old Windsor man died when his car crashed into a ditch after ricocheting off two transports during an 80-mile-per-hour chase along Highway 2 by Sandwich East Police.

In June of the same year a Kingsville man was killed when a car fleeing from an Ontario Provincial Police cruiser crashed into the rear of a trailer on Highway 18. A 24-year-old Hamilton man died in Windsor in December, 1959, when his car crashed over a railway embankment on Elliott St. during a police chase.



# 19-Year-Old Naval Man Killed in Windsor Crash

Robert John McCann, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald G. McCann, Clinton, was killed in a four car collision at the corner of Tecumseh Road and Howard Ave., Windsor, early Saturday morning, July 7. John MacPherson Fraser, 42, Windsor, also was killed in the same accident.

Mr. McCann had been visiting his great-aunt, Mrs. Rachel Scott at 782 Victoria Ave., and had supper at the Fraser home, on Friday. It is believed that Mr. Fraser was driving him over to the government dock when their car was struck.

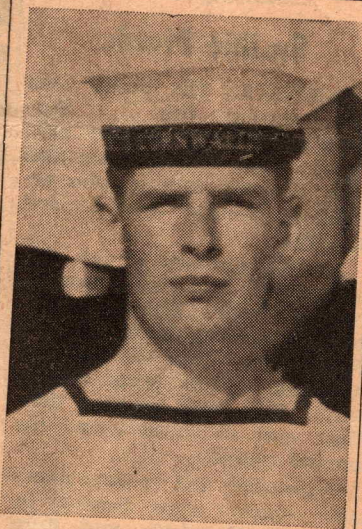
The young man was a radioman in the Royal Canadian Navy, serving on the HMCS Victoriaville, which docked at Windsor on the weekend.

S. P. Knapp, 21, Windsor, has been charged with criminal negligence following the 20-minute chase at speeds up to 110 miles per hour, which led to the crash in which the two men were killed.

Police say that Knapp was

the driver of a stolen car. After the crash he attempted to escape, and police arrested him as he tried to climb a fence.

A passenger in his car was admitted to hospital with severe head injuries.

Apparently the Knapp car had been stopped at Walker and Tecumseh Roads for making an improper left turn. About 45 minutes later it was spotted speeding along Riverside Drive. Police attempted to stop it, and the driver refused to pull over. It was speeding east along Tecumseh Rd. when the accident occurred, and crashed into the Fraser car. Mr. McCann was tossed onto the pavement. Fraser was pinned into the wrecked car. He was an employee of Henry Ford Hospital, Detroit.

After the initial impact the two cars collided with a third car, driven by Richard A. Dinsmore, 27, Garden City, Mich., and it in turn crashed into a car driven by Wallace H. Reaume, Windsor. Neither of them, nor their passengers were severely injured.

Mr. McCann was born in Toronto on December 1, 1942, the son of Ronald G. and Marian McCann. He attended schools here, and enlisted in the Royal Canadian Navy.

Surviving besides his parents are one brother, Douglas, 15, at home; and his grandparents, Dr. and Mrs. Albert J. McCann, Winnipeg and Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Duke, Toronto.

Funeral service was conducted on Tuesday afternoon from the Ball and Mutch funeral home, Clinton, to Clinton Cemetery, with Dr. D. J. Lane, St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Clinton and B. A. Silcox, chaplain of HMCS "Hunter", at Windsor, officiating.

It was a military funeral with a six-man honour guard and six pall-bearers, all members of the Navy serving on HMCS "Victoriaville".

With her crew of 150 the Victoriaville was on a training cruise. The Prestonian class frigate anchored in Goderich harbour on Tuesday at noon, permitting the funeral party to motor to Clinton for the burial duty. The crewmen and officers were back on board by 4 p.m. and the Victoriaville under command of Lt. Com. Rikley, RCN returned to her cruise duties.

# Naval Frigate On Sombre Duty Here

The naval ship standing off the north breakwall, Tuesday afternoon was identified as the Prestonian class frigate HMCS Victoriaville, under command of Lt. Com. Rikley, R.C.N.

With her crew of 150, the Victoriaville was on a Great Lakes training cruise when she was detailed for more sombre duty. Debarking in a motor cutter, a funeral party came ashore to provide naval honors for a young Clinton seaman, A.B.R.M. Robert J. McCann, 19, who met death in a traffic accident, Saturday, in Windsor. Seaman McCann was buried in Clinton cemetery.

Able Seaman McCann was the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald McCann, of Clinton. The fatal accident occurred when the car containing the youth, as passenger, and driven by a family friend, John Fraser, 42, of Roseland, was in collision with an allegedly stolen car at an intersection in Windsor. Mr. Fraser also was killed. Police said the accident occurred when the stolen car, being chased at speeds up to 110 miles per hour, crashed through the crossing as the Fraser car was proceeding under a green light. Two other cars were involved in the impact, resulting in injuries to three other persons.

Arrested and charged with criminal negligence is Samuel P. Knapp, 21, Yawkey Bush, Windsor. Knapp is held in Essex County Jail with bail fixed at \$2,000.

The late "Bob" McCann, a radioman with the R.C.N., was on leave from his ship, anchored at Windsor at the time. He attended public and high schools in Clinton and was well acquainted among the young

people of Clinton.

The military funeral service was conducted under the auspices of the R.C.N., Tuesday afternoon at 2 p.m., from the Ball and Mutch funeral home. Rev. D. J. Lane, of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, conducted the service.

H.M.C.S. Victoriaville came to anchor off Goderich at 12 noon and the burial party, complete with firing squad, came ashore shortly after. Following the burial duty at Clinton, the crewmen and officers returned to Goderich and boarded their cutter for the return to their ship around four o'clock. The Victoriaville then returned to her cruise duties.

### Criminal Negligence Charge

## Driver Committed In Double Fatality

Samuel Patrick Knapp, 21, of Scotten Rd., Highway 18, was committed for trial by judge and jury on a charge of criminal negligence that arose from the traffic death of two men July 7 at Howard Ave. and Tecumseh Rd.

Knapp and Daniel Dumoulin, 22, of 484 Brock St., were remanded to Aug. 10 for election and plea on a charge of car theft.

**Killed in the accident which climaxed a police chase that reached speeds up to 100 miles an hour were John MacPherson Fraser, 42, of 908 Ducharme Ave., Roseland, and Robert John McCann, of Clinton.**

Sergeant Charles Ostopovich testified that the car driven by Knapp made an irregular left turn onto Riverside Dr. from Ouellette Ave. early Saturday morning, July 7.

He said he pursued the car west on Riverside Dr. at speeds up to 100 miles an hour. The Knapp auto was speeding erratically and just missed hitting two cars at a bridge on Riverside Dr. at Cameron Ave.

The chase continued along Riverside Dr., south along Huron Line and east on Tecumseh Rd. until the sergeant lost the speeding car in heavy traffic.

After he radioed for assistance, the car was spotted at Wellington Ave. and Tecumseh Rd., still speeding.

**Constable Ronald Thompson gave evidence that he was in the police cruiser that began chasing the Knapp car again. The chase continued along Tecumseh Rd. and at Dougall Rd. the car veered into the westbound traffic lane and made a right turn onto Dougall against a red traffic signal.**

The car travelled south on Dougall to Jackson St., went the wrong way down one-way Jackson St. to Pellissier St. and north on Pellissier back to Tecumseh.

The car was finally stopped after it was driven through a red light at Howard Ave., swinging out into the westbound lane and smashing into a car, northbound on Howard, in which the two victims were riding.

After the crash, in which a passenger in the Knapp car was

also seriously injured, Knapp ran north across the Windsor Utilities lawn and tried to escape but was caught trying to climb a fence at the back of the building by Constable Charles Williams.

A dog bite victim was acquitted of a charge of cruelty to an animal after court was told the man was bitten in his own yard and retaliated with the brush end of a broom.

The charge was brought against Donald Noah, 30, of 459 Lot St., Apt. 1, after he was bitten June 29 by a dog owned by William Shaw, a blind man, who lives in the same building.

Evidence given was that Noah

## Playground Attendance Down 309

The average daily attendance for the first month at Windsor's 27 parks has fallen behind the 1961 figures by 309.

Figures released by the Windsor Department of Parks and Recreation show that for the first month in 1961, 9,269 children used the facilities compared to 8,960 for this year's first month.

The biggest single daily increase is at Lanspeary Park where 175 more children use the park than in 1961. Following closely are Wilson and Gignac parks with 159 and 158 daily increase over last year.

The biggest drop in daily attendance has been at Prince Rd. which is down 408 children per day from 1961.

Other parks who have upped their daily attendance are A.K.O., 87, Bridgeview, 6, Dougall, 2, Essex Court (operating only two years) 123, Labadie, 110, Mitchell, 141, Norman, 116, Riverview, 22, Stodgell, 59, Wigle, 95, Willistead, 114.

## Victims Get \$31,367 In Actions

**\$10,000 Awarded  
Widow of July  
Traffic Fatality**

Damage actions resulting from traffic accidents brought in, juried persons a total of \$31,367 in settlements and awards made at sittings of the Supreme Court of Ontario here.

Largest single settlement was for \$10,000, awarded to Mrs. Jeanne Fraser, widow of John MacPherson Fraser, 908 Ducharme Ave., who was killed in a two-car collision July 7, 1962, at Tecumseh Rd. and Howard Ave.

The action was brought against Samuel Patrick Knapp, 27, of Scotton Rd., Highway 18, driver of the second car. A passenger in the Fraser car, Robert John McCann, 19, of Clinton, was also killed in the crash which ended a police chase of Knapp's car at speeds up to 110 miles an hour. The settlement was made under the Fatal Accidents Act.

Second largest award was \$7,000, to Frederick William Bailey, 23, of R. R. 1, Amherstburg, in an action brought against Mr. and Mrs. Richard Bratt, of R. R. 1, Amherstburg.

Mr. Bailey sustained head injuries in a collision of cars driven by himself and Mrs. Bratt, 22, at the Seventh Concession Rd. and the Middle Sideroad in Maiden Twp. on Sept. 2, 1962.

A total of \$5,000 was awarded in settlement of two actions resulting from the same accident June 22, 1962, at Foster Ave. and Walker Rd., when a salesman for Downtown Motor Sales (Windsor) Limited was killed in a two-car crash while demonstrating a car for a prospective customer.

The actions were brought against Downtown Motor Sales, one by Otto Karl Samann, 403 Parkview Dr., Riverside, and his son, Walter, 29, who were in the car with the salesman, John Lawrence Nolan, 988 Monmouth Rd.; the second by Ralph Edward Cooper, 18, of R. R. 2, Maidstone, driver of the second car, and his passenger, William Arthur Arps, 16, of Colchester North Twp. All persons concerned suffered various injuries. Arps and Cooper each were awarded \$2,000, while Mr. Samann and his son were awarded a total of \$1,000.

Special and general damages totalling \$7,000 were awarded Miss Suzanne Hurley, 18, of 149 Lakeshore Dr.; her father, John T. Hurley, and Miss Shirley Jamieson, 26, of R. R. 2, Belle River, in an action against John Lepski, 25, of Kitchener.

Miss Jamieson receives \$3,000, Miss Hurley, \$2,000, and Mr. Hurley, \$1,000. The women were injured when the car owned by Mr. Hurley, and driven by Miss Jamieson, was hit in the rear by Mr. Lepski's vehicle on Highway 401 near Essex County Rd. on Nov. 29, 1960.

Mr. and Mrs. John Declara, of Colton, were awarded \$2,360 in an action against Russell Rogers, R. R. 1, Kingsville, as the result of a collision between trucks driven by Mrs. Declara and Mr. Rogers Nov. 9, 1960, on County Rd. 22 east of Highway 1.

Knapp was arrested after a 20-minute police chase at speeds up to 110 m.p.h. through Windsor streets that led to a violent four-car crash at Tecumseh Rd. and Howard Ave.

**Killed were Robert John McCann, 19, of Clinton, Ont., a sailor serving on H.M.C.S. Victoriaville, which docked here during the weekend, and John MacPherson Fraser, 42, of 908 Ducharme Ave., Roseland, the driver of one of the cars involved.**

A third person, Daniel Dumoulin, 22, of 484 Brock St., is in satisfactory condition in Metropolitan Hospital where he is being treated for head injuries. He was a passenger in the speeding car driven by Knapp.

The McCann youth had been visiting his great-aunt, Mrs. Rachel Scott, 782 Victoria Ave., Friday afternoon, and had supper at Mr. Fraser's home. It is believed Mr. Fraser was driving the sailor back to his ship at the government dock when their car was struck and both were killed.

The youth's body was taken to the Ball and Mutch Funeral Home, Clinton. A military funeral with a 12-man honor guard will be conducted Tuesday at 2 p.m. in Clinton.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. G. McCann, and one brother, Douglas, 15, all of Clinton.
