ADMIRAL'S NESSAGE

The greatest threat to the security of the free world today is the missile-equipped submarine.

To combat this menace the Royal Canadian Navy must have in readiness a fully modern and highly mobile fleet, maintained at all times at maximum efficiency.

The commissioning of Her Majesty's Canadian Ship Cape Scott is an important step towards the achievement of this objective. As the RCN's first escort repair ship, the Cape Scott will carry the heavy responsibility of providing repair maintenance facilities for antisubmarine escort vessels away from home port.

The advantages to the Atlantic Command of these new facilities are obvious and should result in a significant increase in the operational mobility and flexibility of the fleet, so essential to modern antisubmarine warfare.

To the Captain, Officers and Men of the Cape Scott, I extend my best wishes for a happy and most successful commission.

HISTORY

HNCS CAPE SCOTT

(ex-Beachy Head, ex-Vulkaan)

The first maintenance ship to be built in Canada's West Coast shipyards, the "Cape Scott" was launched on September 27, 1944, at the yards of Burrard Drydock Company, North Vancouver.

She was commissioned into the Royal Navy as HMS Beachy Head on March 27, 1945, at Vancouver, under the command of Captain C.K. Adam, DSO, RN.

She left Esquimalt, B.C., on May 20, 1945, for San Franciso and on May 26 sailed from there for Pearl Harbor and the East Indies.

The Beachy Head served with the RN until April 15, 1947, when she was loaned to the Royal Netherlands Navy and re-named the Vulkaan.

She was returned to the RN in 1950, reverting to her name of Beachy Head. In 1952 she returned to Canada and the same year was renamed "Cape Scott".

On her arrival in Canada, the "Cape Scott" was placed in reserve at Halifax. In May, 1958, she was taken in hand for fitting out. She had been used to provide a limited amount of training of naval technical apprentices from HMCS "Cape Breton" a sister ship, which lay alongside her at Halifax and served as the technical apprentice training establishment.

SHIP'S BADGE

Blazon:

Argent, a cross Azure charged in the centre with a thistle or and interlaced with a gear-wheel Gules.

Significance:

Cape Scott on Vancouver Island was named by Captain Lowrie and Captain Guise in honour of David Scott a merchant of Bombay who



assisted in organizing in 1786, a trading expedition from that Port to Nootka Sound. These officers commanded the ships "Captain Cook" and "Experiment" respectively.

The blue cross in the badge is taken from the flag of the Trustees of the Port of Bombay; the gear-wheel refers to one of the functions of HMCS CAPE SCOTT as a maintenance Vessel, and the thistle of course, is in reference to the name "Scott".

Ship's Colours:

White and Blue.

ROLE OF THE SHIP

Her majesty's Canadian Ship "Cape Scott" is the first repair ship for fleet support to be commissioned into the Royal Canadian Navy.

The ship has well equipped Machine Shops, Electrical, Electronic and Sonar Repair Shops. Facilities are provided for Instrument and Teletype repair. A Helicopter Repair Shop, Ordnance Workshop, Shipwright Shop and Foundry are also fitted aboard.

The main functions of H.M.C.S. "Cape Scott" will be to provide repair facilities for escort vessels away from home and to provide limited logistic support for the fleet.
