

What a unique experience it is for all of us to serve in the Standing Naval Force Atlantic. A permanent multi-national naval squadron had never existed in the long run of maritime history until STANAVFORLANT was formed in 1969. Our experience is unique because the Squadron and its concept are unique in the world.

During these interesting times, the Standing Naval Force Atlantic represents in many ways, much of what is best in NATO; the ability of ships from different NATO navies to work and fight in a multi-threat environment as a cohesive fighting task group, to employ the same tactics and operational procedures and to combine the strength of the various weapons systems in a compatible and effective way. 

## Standing Naval Force Atlantic

The Standing Naval Force
Atlantic (STANAVFORLANT) is a
unique naval entity. It is the first
permanent international naval
squadron ever formed.

Binding together this multinational force is its common purpose. Its mission includes four basic objectives. First, the squadron must be capable of rapid deployment to a threatened area in times of crisis or tension. It represents an immediately available deterent naval force, SACLANT'S immediately reaction force.

Second, STANAVFORLANT is charged with contributing to NATO maritime effectiveness. This is achieved through participation in both large and smaller scale NATO exercises. Furthermore in the course of providing continuous squadron experience and training, STANAVFORLANT serves as a development vechicle for new NATO tactics.

Third, STANAVFORLANT demonstrates the solidarity of the alliance by showing the flags of the various member nations in a single multi-national force.

Normally, during the course of the year, the squadron will visit some twenty-five to thirty ports, including a deployment to the east coast of the United States and Canada.

As the fourth objective, the squadron could form the nucleus around which a more powerful and versatile naval force could be built.
