- Class for Conduct.**—The date of proposed restoration may be any date not less than 3 months and not more than 6 calendar months from date of reduction. See Art. 567, K.R.
- Good Conduct Medal and Gratuity.**—Recommendations are to be made according to the instructions in Arts. 534, cl. 3, and 606, cl. 4, K.R. If the recommendation is intentionally withheld, a statement to that effect should be inserted. (See Art. 534, cl. 15.)
- Whether Recommended for Advancement.**—To be completed in respect of all Art. 413 ratings by inserting "Yes," "Not Yet" or "No" (but see notes (1), (2) and (3) below):
  - "Yes"—Recommended for advancement. To be followed by (N.Q.) if not fully qualified; this, if awarded in a sea-going ship, will count as a sea-going recommendation for men who require this qualification, although such men are not qualified for recommendation on Form S. 507.
  - "Not Yet"—To be used for ratings not yet recommended for advancement owing to their inexperience. To be followed by (N.Q.) if not fully qualified.
  - "No"—Not recommended, whether qualified or not.For Leading Seamen, Leading Signalmen, Able Seamen and Signalmen insert also "S.G.R." or "H.R." according as the ship is or is not a "sea-going" ship (Appendix XVII, Part 1, para. 10) in relation to the individual rating concerned.

HISTORY OF PRESENT ILLNESS: This man was in good health until the latter part of Nov. 43 (3 months ago) at which time he became conscious of a fullness in his upper abdomen. It was a constant symptom and it bore no relationship to meals. His appetite was normal and he suffered no dyspepsia. About the same time he observed that he became easily fatigued, but in other respects he felt normal. During December he observed a gradually increasing swelling of his upper and mid abdomen so that he had difficulty in buttoning his trousers. Concomitant with the swelling he began to feel some mid-abdominal soreness. It ran like a band across his anterior abdominal wall and it was continuous. About the 2nd week in January the soreness became an actual pain sharp in character and running from the umbilical area, across his right loin and around toward the spine. The pain was worse in the A.M. and was relieved by activity. He felt full after eating but his appetite remained good and eating did not aggravate the pain. He began to notice frequency of urination and nocturia about the middle of January, the first time he had had such symptoms in his life. He also felt nauseated at times, but he was never able to vomit. His bowel function remained normal. The original symptom of fatigue was becoming worse during this period. On February 1 he reported to Sick Bay, Cornwallis, for the first time. The abdominal pain was his major complaint. He was xrayed and put on a fat-free diet and after a few days in bed the pain which had radiated to his back disappeared. There has been no improvement in his general health or recession of the abdominal swelling after 19 days in bed. He was admitted this morning to RCNH for further observation. He estimated his weight loss at about 5 lbs. Had a fever 1st day in Sick Bay.

PREVIOUS ILLNESSES: Angioneurotic oedema, July '43. Saint John, N.B. 8 days in hospital. Has had this before a number of times, requiring adrenalin on 3-4 occasions. Allergy to lobster. German Measles. Asthma 1931, damp weather, hay dust.

FAMILY HISTORY: Mother and father alive and well.  
Four brothers alive and well.  
Two sisters alive and well. One died from meningitis.  
One died in infancy.

PERSONAL HISTORY: Born in Broughton, Cape Breton, educated in Mira Gut, NS went to Grade XL. Fisherman for several years then brakeman on railroad for 5 years before joining the Navy in July '42. Has not had any sea time. Has been 10 months in Saguenay 'training ship'. Does not smoke. Does not drink. Not married. No V.D.



**REVIEW OF SYSTEMS:**

**C.V.:** Dyspnea with asthma. Condition varies with locality, worse in Cape Breton and in damp weather. Has never required adrenalin for the asthma. No oedema. No palpitation.

**Resp:** No chronic cough, has a fairly continuous flow of dark sputum which is ascribed to asthmatic condition. Never blood streaked. No chest pain.

**G.I.S:** As above. No vomiting since onset present illness. Bowel habit normal and unchanged. Has not noticed melena or other abnormalities.

**G.U.S:** Frequency and nocturia during January. Improved since Feb. 1. Now voids 3-4 times in 24 hours. No burning. No hematuria. No discharge.

**Nerv.S:** Sleeps poorly because of soreness. No headache. Perspires freely.

**PHYSICAL EXAMINATION:**

**General:** A thin faced man of short stature and rapidly thinning hair. Cheeks sunken but with a malar flush. Skin sallow if not iteric. Looks debilitated & tired.

**Head & Neck:** Pupils - equal, react to light, nystagmus unsustained in lateral fields. Ears - drums normal. Mouth - teeth fair shape. Tongue coated and breath is "liverish" in odor. Tonsils small. Chronic inflammation. Pharynx negative. Neck - no cervical adenopathy.

**Chest:** Narrow shoulders - wasting of musculature. Diminished (bilateral) excursion. Emphysematous type. Percussion. Hyper-resonant in both upper lobes. Liver dullness is abnormally high on right side running from level of 5th rib in nipple line to a point at the angle of right scapula. Dullness in left chest to level of 6th rib in nipple line. Slight diminution of fremitus and also of breath sounds in this area. More marked on right side. No rales or rhonchi heard.

**Heart:** No clinical enlargement or displacement. No murmurs or arrhythmias. B.P. 110/60. Rate 92.

**Abdomen:** Whole upper 2/3 abdomen is protruberant, the result of gross enlargement of the liver. Lower margin is palpated over McBurney's point and it runs toward umbilicus before becoming contiguous with what appears to be a greatly enlarged spleen. The edge is moderately firm but is not tender. The liver surface is very firm and there are several nodular elevations on its surface. These are not definitely umbilicated and they have a tendency to be contiguous in the epigastric region. The splenic enlargement is less marked but there is more tenderness in that area. Over both these organs the percussion note is flat - the remainder of the abdomen is very tympanitic. No evidence of fluid or shifting dullness. There is also a little tenderness in the region of the left kidney.

**Rectal:** Negative. No hemorrhoids. Genitalia - negative.

**Skin:** Perspiring. Moderate pallor, possibly some icterus.

**Extremities:** Moderate wasting of shoulders and arms.

**Adenopathy** - only palpable gland in right axilla.

**IMPRESSION:** Secondary Carcinoma. Myelogenous Leukemia. Bant's Cirrhosis.

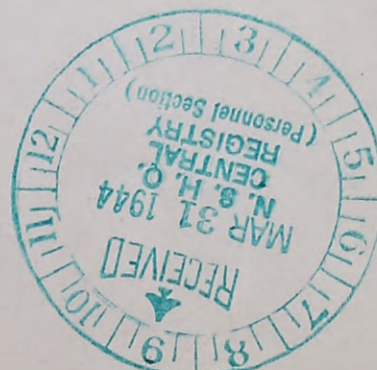

Evidence of Surgeon Lieutenant Robert S. Swan, R.C.N.V.R.,

NAME: SURGEON LIEUTENANT ROBERT S. SWAN, R.C.N.V.R.

CALLED AND CAUTIONED.

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1 Q Are you Surgeon Lieutenant Robert S. Swan, R.C.N.V.R?

A I am.

2 Q What is your present appointment?

A Medical Officer to Captain (D), H.M.D. Dockyard.

3 Q Would you explain to the Board your knowledge of the circumstances surrounding the death of Willard Jackson Tutty, Stoker 1, Official Number V-44785, in the Royal Canadian Naval Hospital, Halifax, N.S., at 0900 on 27th. March, 1944?

A The rating mentioned was admitted to my Ward in the R.C.N.H. Halifax, on 19th. February, 1944. He was referred to this hospital from H.M.C.S. "CORNWALLIS". The history of his complaint dates back to the early weeks of December, 1943, at which time he observed that he was becoming progressively weak and that his abdomen was commencing to swell. This condition persisted without much variation for the ensuing six weeks, by which time the swelling had increased, and he was starting to have some abdominal pain. There were no significant gastro-intestinal symptoms at that time apart from the pain. By February 1st. the symptoms had become aggravated and he presented himself at the Sick Bay in H.M.C.S. "CORNWALLIS". His case was investigated there and because of inadequate laboratory and surgical facilities he was referred to R.C.N.H., Halifax, for further treatment. There was nothing in his previous medical records to suggest a cause for his condition. On physical examination he was found to have a very protruberent abdomen due to gross enlargement of his liver and spleen. A radiological examination revealed that there was an obstructive mass in his lower bowel, and it was the considered opinion of the consultants who saw him, that the primary cause of his disease was a malignant growth in that area.

4 Q Is that the first time it was definitely ascertained to be cancer?

A Yes.

5 Q Yes?

A On the 25th. of February, because of a partial large bowel obstruction, it was considered advisable to perform a caesostomy. At the operation the identity of the lesion in the lower colon was substantiated, and a biopsy specimen was taken from the liver to corroborate the clinical diagnosis. The patient's condition after the operation was fair. He received intravenous glucose and blood plasma that day and during the subsequent week.

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The report of the microscopic examination of the liver specimen was examined by Dr. Ralph Smith, the Consultant Pathologist at Dalhousie University. He reported "The gross and histological appearances reveal an adenocarcinomatous metastases of the liver."

- 6 Q Now did any opinion come to you from H.M.C.S. "CORNWALLIS" officially about the condition this rating was suffering of, or did he just walk into Sick Bay and report his condition?
- A This rating was sent by stretcher and train from H.M.C.S. "CORNWALLIS" to Halifax, and accompanying him were copies of all the clinical and laboratory investigation that was carried out there.
- 7 Q Did they offer any diagnosis?
- A It was considered by the Medical Consultant at H.M.C.S. "CORNWALLIS" that the most likely diagnosis in this case was secondary carcinoma of the liver. The primary lesion was not ascertained until the man was in R.C.N.H., Halifax.
- 8 Q Who performed the operation?
- A The operation was performed by Surgeon Commander W. L. McKenzie.
- 9 Q Where is Surgeon Commander McKenzie serving now?
- A He is at H.M.C.S. "PROTECTOR".
- 10 Q In an operation of this type would there be much hope of saving the patient's life?
- A In my opinion none whatsoever.
- 11 Q Well in your opinion then, what would be the purpose of the operation?
- A The purpose of the operation was to relieve the symptoms of intestinal obstruction which were causing the patient a great deal of pain and discomfort.
- 12 Q I don't suppose there could be any question of this condition being aggravated or attributable in any way to the Naval Service?
- A None whatsoever.
- 13 Q Did he have any diarrhoea or constipation while he was at H.M.C.S. "CORNWALLIS" to your knowledge?
- A The patient didn't have either diarrhoea or constipation.

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- 14 Q Did he have any symptoms referable to his gastro-intestinal tract?
- A His major symptom was abdominal pain. There was no sign indicating obstruction of the bowel. He complained of abdominal fullness after eating but his appetite remained good and his bowel function was normal. There was no history of passage of blood from the rectum.
- 15 Q What did you consider the enlargement of the abdomen and the signs and symptoms that were present at H.M.C.S. "CORNWALLIS" were due to?
- A The symptoms were due directly to the size of the liver and spleen.
- 16 Q Then in your opinion were the initial symptoms due to the liver?
- A Yes.
- 17 Q Roughly how long do you think the cancer had been there before he developed these liver signs?
- A Because of the advanced degree of malignancy I should think that the primary lesion was of relatively recent development, probably a matter of two or three months.
- 18 Q Two or three months before the end of November?
- A Yes.
- 19 Q Was there a post mortem obtained on this case?
- A Not to my knowledge.
- 20 Q Do you feel that medical records would have been more complete and medicine would have been furthered by having a post mortem on this case?
- A Yes. After the time of the operation the patient was transferred to another ward and he was no longer under my care after 1st. March, 1944.
- 21 Q Who would normally order a post mortem, doctor?
- A Post mortems are as a rule requested by the attending physician or surgeon. Permission to perform one must be granted by the relatives of the patient. The only exception to this is calling a post mortem by the District Coroner, for medico-legal purposes.
- 22 Q Do I understand from your statement that the man had cancer of the intestine and of the liver too?
- A Yes.
- 23 Q Would you have said there would have been a

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better chance through an operation, if it had been performed at an earlier date?

A It might possibly have prolonged the patient's life by a matter of weeks or months, but owing to the high degree of malignancy of the original lesion, it is highly unlikely that the benefit of an early operation would have prolonged his life substantially.

24 Q Do you consider that the man was given the proper treatment at H.M.C.S. "CORNWALLIS" before he came under your care?

A Yes.

25 Q After 1st. March, when you stated this man was moved to another Ward, did you at that time expect that he would recover?

A No.

26 Q Do you think surgically and clinically everything was done for this patient that reasonably could have been done?

A I do. He was given a full and complete investigation as soon after his admission to hospital as it was possible to do. The operation was performed by a highly competent surgeon and for the most part of his illness he was given the benefit of a private room and special nursing care.

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- A The first time I saw this patient was at 1055 on 27th. March, 1944. He was expiring at that time.
- 30 Q Do you know what the diagnosis was at that time?
- A Yes.
- 31 Q What was it?
- A Carcinoma of the large bowel and secondary of the liver.
- 32 Q Had an operation been performed at that time?
- A Yes.
- 33 Q You didn't see the patient until after the operation had been performed?
- A No.
- 34 Q Was there any post mortem?
- A I don't think there was any, I have no idea.
- 35 Q Do you think there should have been?
- A Yes, it is a routine procedure.
- 36 Q Do you know if any steps were taken to ask the relative's permission?
- A No. I merely filled out his documents and sent them down to the office.
- 37 Q Were you there when he died?
- A Yes.
- 38 Q If this man had cancer of the large bowel alone, is that condition inoperable?
- A Under certain conditions it is.
- 39 Q When secondaries have occurred in the liver is the condition operable?
- A No.
- 40 Q When this man first developed symptoms in November 1943, in your opinion were these symptoms referable to the secondary cancer or to the primary one?
- A Now I couldn't answer that question, I have no idea.
- 41 Q Have you looked at the history?
- A I did a few days ago, yes. You see that is

42 Q In your opinion were the symptoms that he experienced before he first presented himself at Sick Bay at H.M.C.S. "CORNWALLIS", were they due to the secondary growth in the liver, or were they primarily due to the cancer of the large bowel?

A In my opinion yes.

43 Q In your opinion they were due to the secondary growth in the liver?

A Yes.

44 Q Then in your opinion the man was inoperable at the time he presented himself at Sick Bay in H.M.C.S. "CORNWALLIS"?

A I would say so. I can only hazard a guess you know. Generally speaking these sort of cases are inoperable unless they are gotten early. I submit my opinion on that basis.

45 Q In your opinion what would be the purpose of the operation?

A Well there is the opportunity of doing some good to the patient, relieving his symptoms of obstruction, and so on, by doing what they call a caecostomy, side tracking the contents of the bowel, and it prolongs his life.

46 Q From your knowledge of this case, and with this case history, would you say that everything was done, surgically and clinically, for this rating that could reasonably be expected?

A Undoubtedly, there is no question about it.

47 Q Thank you doctor.

COMPLAINTS: Abdominal swelling - 3 months.  
Abdominal pain - 2 months.  
Nausea  
Fatigue.

HISTORY OF PRESENT ILLNESS: This man was in good health until the latter part of Nov. 43 (3 months ago) at which time he became conscious of a fullness in his upper abdomen. It was a constant symptom and it bore no relationship to meals. His appetite was normal and he suffered no dyspepsia. About the same time he observed that he became easily fatigued, but in other respects he felt normal. During December he observed a gradually increasing swelling of his upper and mid abdomen so that he had difficulty in buttoning his trousers. Concomitant with the swelling he began to feel some mid-abdominal soreness. It ran like a band across his anterior abdominal wall and it was continuous. About the 2nd. week in January the soreness became an actual pain sharp in character and running from the umbilical area, across his right loin and around toward the spine. The pain was worse in the A.M. and was relieved by activity. He felt full after eating but his appetite remained good and eating did not aggravate the pain. He began to notice frequency in urination and nocturia about the middle of January, the first time he had had such symptoms in his life. He also felt nauseated at times, but he was never able to vomit. His bowel function remained normal. The original symptom of fatigue was becoming worse during this period. On February 1 he reported to Sick Bay, Cornwallis for the first time. The abdominal pain was his major complaint. He was x-rayed and put on a fat-free diet and after a few days in bed the pain which had radiated to his back disappeared. There has been no improvement in his general health or recession of the abdominal swelling after 19 days in bed. He was admitted this morning to RCNH for further observation. He estimated his weight loss at about 5 lbs. Had a fever 1st day in Sick Bay.

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8 days in hospital. Has had this before a number of times, requiring adrenalin on 3-4 occasions. Allergy to lobster. German measles. Asthma 1931, damp weather, hay dust.

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Four brothers alive and well.  
Two sisters alive and well. One died from meningitis. One died in infancy.

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REVIEW OF SYSTEMS:

- C.V.: Dyspnea with asthma. Condition varies with locality, worse in Cape Breton and in damp weather. Has never required adrenaline for the asthma. No oedema. No palpitation.
- Resp: No chronic cough, has a fairly continuous flow of dark sputum which is ascribed to asthmatic condition. Never blood streaked. No chest pain.
- G.I.S. As above. No vomiting since onset present illness. Bowel habit normal and unchanged. Has not noticed melena or other abnormalities.
- G.U.S. Frequency and nocturia during January. Improved Since Feb. 1. Now voids 3-4 times in 24 hours. No burning. No hematuria. No discharge.
- Nerv.S. Sleeps poorly because of soreness. No headache. Perspires freely.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION: A thin faced man of short stature and rapidly thinning hair. Cheeks sunken but with a malar flush. Skin sallow if not icteric. Look debilitated & tired.

Head & Neck: Pupils - equal, react to light, systagmus unsustained in lateral fields. Ears - drums normal. Mouth - teeth fair shape. Tongue coated and breath is "liverish" in odor. Tonsils small. Chronic inflammation. Pharynx negative. Neck - no cervical adenopathy.

Chest: Narrow shoulders - wasting/musculature. Diminished (bilateral) excursion. Emphysematous type. Percussion. Hyper-resonant in both upper lobes. Liver dullness is abnormally high on right side running from level of 5th rib in nipple line to a point at the angle of right scapula. Dullness in left chest to level of 6th rib in nipple line. Slight diminution of fremitus and also of breath sounds in this area. More marked on right side. No rales or rhonchi heard.

Heart: No clinical enlargement or displacement. No murmurs or arrhythmias. B.P. 110/60, Rate 92.

Abdomen: Whole upper 2/3 abdomen is protuberant, the result of gross enlargement of the liver. Lower margin is palpated over McBurney's point and it runs toward umbilicus before becoming contiguous with what appears to be a greatly enlarged spleen. The edge is moderately firm but is not tender. The liver surface is very firm and there are several nodular elevations on its surface. These are not definitely umbilicated and they have a tendency to be contiguous in the epigastric region. The spleen enlargement is less marked but there is more tenderness in that area. Over both these organs the percussion note is flat - the remainder of the abdomen is very tympanitic. No evidence of fluid or shifting dullness. There is also a little tenderness in the region of the left kidney.

Rectal: Negative. No hemorrhoids. Genitalia - negative.

Skin: Perspiring. Moderate pallor, possibly some icterus.

Extremities: Moderate wasting of shoulders and arms.

Adenopathy - only palpable gland in right axilla.

IMPRESSION: Secondary carcinoma. Myelogenous Leukemia. Bant's Cirrhosis.

22/2/44. Review of case history received from Cornwallis shows that their findings were identical to those already recorded.

Radiology - intravenous pyelogram 7.2.44, displacement down and poor visualization of right kidney.

Chest - 2.2.44 - normal. Lumbar Spine - spine normal, soft shadowing suggesting liver enlargement.

Laboratory Findings:

Van den Bergh - direct negative. Serum bilirubin 1.1 mgm%.

Stool - positive for blood ~~++~~ at Cornwallis.

Xray - as described in Dr. Lewis' note. Official report not yet received. The diagnosis is now fairly well established. The rapid cachexia make the desirability of surgery questionable, i.e. in the absence of obstruction. He still has daily bowel movements but today admits to some increase in difficulty in maintaining his regular habit. Consultation to Surgical Consultant today.

24.2.44 Castor oil given evening of 21/2/44 caused increase of abdominal cramps and vomiting the following day. This was given as part of the preparation for a barium enema (2nd attempt) the first having been unsuccessful because of neglected preliminary procedures. Surgical Consultant saw the man on P.M. of 22. and advocated a Miller Abbott tube. Now, after 48 hours there has been no success in passing the tube beyond the pylorus, due to, presumably, to the compression of the stomach by the mass. Each time it has been introduced the tube coils back upon itself, inside the stomach. This measure has relieved the vomiting. Xray shows an obstruction just below the splenic flexure, most probably a neoplasm and most probably a malignant one. Patient has passed flatus today. Now bowel movement since yesterday morning. Cramps and discomfort much better. Has been on intravenous glucose and plasma (yesterday and today) Chlorides, plasma proteins and CO2 combining power are normal. Transfer to surgery. Surg. Lt. R. Swan.

25/2/44. Seen by Dr. MacKenzie. Caecostomy performed. Liver biopsy taken. Glucose saline 1000 c.c. and plasma 250 CC before and at operation. Later 500 cc saline glucose. Tube connected to bottle but no discharge. Patients condition fair.

26/2/44. 500 c.c. plasma and 1000 glucose saline. Patient drinking slightly. Tube irrigated with very small amount of warm normal saline. Still no discharge. Patient feels well.

29/2/44. Condition unchanged. Feels fairly well. Irrigated caecostomy which is functioning after a fashion. Does not eat solid food. So 1000 cc 5% glucose given. Complains of some distension.

1/3/44. Condition unchanged. Irrigated caecostomy. 1000 cc 5% glucose saline intravenous. Feels extremely distended. Seems to be due to ascitic fluid. Surg. Lt. A.F. Pasquet.

3/3/44 0200. There has been apparently no drainage through caecostomy tube during last evening and night. Patient having increasing pain, crampy in nature and tightness of abdomen. A short while ago, noticed dressing, bed etc. saturated with fluid obviously coming from around tube which is in place. Discomfort eased considerably. Tube irrigated. Fluid does not run in and out freely with gentle pressure. Since drainage is satisfactory around tube it is left to be dealt with in A.M. Surg. Lt. F.O. Topping.

7/3/44. Attempted paracentesis, but due to resonance throughout abdomen, lower, suggesting dilated bowel and as the trocar could not be inserted without great pressure causing severe pain throughout abdomen it was discontinued and dry dressing applied. (no fluid obtained). RX. Morphine gr. 1/4.

14/3/44. No change. Very uncomfortable. Tremendous quantity of morphia required so cobra venom therapy started.

24/3/44. Gradually getting worse but still fairly strong. Distension now extreme. Oedema of legs severe, also slight in scrotum.

Difficulty in breathing.



26/3/44. Patient growing gradually weaker, semi conscious. Does not react.

27/3/44. Patient succumbed at 8.55 A.M.  
Office notified.

Surgeon's Findings: Right rectus incision. The liver was enlarged to several times normal and presented multiple masses of secondary tumour. One of them was the size of small egg in the liver edge and was removed for biopsy. On palpation of the splenic flexure there was a nodular very fixed mass which presented what I think was a large intraluminal ulcer. It was impossible to separate it from the lateral wall. The caecum very fixed so it was sutured to the abdominal wall and a tube caecostomy done. 400 cc of straw coloured fluid in peritoneal cavity.

Surg. Cmdr. MacKenzie.

Tissue Report: 1/3/44. The gross and histological appearances reveal an adenocarcinomatous metastases of the liver.

Ralph Smith. M.D. D.P.H.

Surgical Report: 22/2/44. Weakness, upper abdominal fullness and discomfort, with bouts of fairly acute pain. Began 1st. Dec. Swelling of upper abdomen noted 3 x 4 weeks. No diarrhoea. No definite obstruction but some tendency to constipation. Exam. large mass size of football, hard and fairly regular upper abdomen, more prominent R.U.Q. but there is also some extension to left side as well. Latter is possibly left lobe of liver but I get the impression that the whole tumor is one mass possibly a lymphosarcoma arising from the stomach. In that event it would be difficult to state where the liver ends and the tumor mass begins. His obstruction at the splenic flexure of course brings up the problem of this being the primary focus and the upper abdominal mass being secondary. I feel that this is unlikely due to his blood being up and the extensive tumor mass present in the upper abdomen. Poor response to castor oil, subsequent vomiting and obstruction by ray would indicate:

1. O per os.
  2. Miller Abbott tube to decompress him.
  3. I.V. fluids 2500 c.c. - 3000 c.c. at least daily.
  4. Blood urea, cl. & CO2 combining power.
  5. A little plasma might help.
  6. Grouping for future use of whole blood.
  7. Heat to his abdomen. Turpentine stupes and electric pad.
- Will be glad to follow with you.

Surg. Cmdr. MacKenzie.

Blood: 1/3/44. W.B.C. 14300



Xrays : Film No. 22,638 23/2/44.

Abdomen: Two flat plates of the abdomen were made to demonstrate the position of the Miller Abbott tube. The first of these shows the tube partly coiled upon itself lying in the upper portion of the stomach. The second film demonstrates two complete loops of the tube lying within the stomach, the tip of the tube is lying approximately at the pylorus but has not entered the duodenum.

Opinion: Miller Abbott tube has not progressed beyond the stomach.

Surg. Lt. Stapleton.

Chest: Fluroroscopic examination made at the same time as the barium enema showed no widening of the mediastinal shadow but some suggestion of slight increase in the broncho-vascular markings. No parenchymal disease. The diaphragmatic domes were moving synchronously and were not particularly elevated. Normal size of the heart. A chest film made on the same day demonstrates no evidence of abnormality.

Opinion: Apparently healthy chest.

Barium Enema: Upon injection of barium the rectum and sigmoid filled readily. We observed a stoppage of the flow in the descending colon at level of approximately 2" above the iliac crest. In spite of persistent attempts to make the fluid progress in further we had no success. Rotation of the patient in every possible position was useless. We observed a persistent filling defect, fairly smooth in outline at level of the obstruction. There appeared to be a fairly smooth defect with rounded edges suggesting the appearance of intra-susception which would be a very unusual occurrence in that area. An intrinsic neo-plasma could give the same appearance. A second attempt was made to inject the barium further, on February 22nd., that is on the following day and we obtained the same result and the same picture. The moderate amount of gas and faecal material in the right and transverse segments of the colon. Opinion: Retrograde obstruction in the descending colon with presence of a filling defect suggesting a neo-plasma of undetermined etiology, approximately 2" above the iliac crest.

Abdomen: Flat plates of the abdomen made at different intervals shows no evidence of gas in the bowel. No radiological evidence of intestinal obstruction.

On the 1st. film the Miller Abbot tube was reaching the cardiac end of the oesophagus. On the 2nd. film made later, the tube appeared to be present in the stomach and completely coiled over itself, the leading end being under the diaphragmatic dome. Opinion: No radiological evidence of distention with gas of the bowel. Miller Abbott tube coiled in the stomach.


